I knew the play was a comedy by its form, but had never expected to laugh so wholeheartedly. It is a testament to your abilities as actors that you can draw out the humour and truthful human conflict from the script. Your dedication to shows is inspiring and the technical abilities you have to translate vague wafflings into an imaginative sound and lighting design, seamlessly executed, is simply astounding.
